

THOUGHTS FROM PASTOR

Resurrection Sunday is my favorite holiday of the year. I remember as an eleven-year-old, I came down with chickenpox three days before Resurrection Sunday; however, I hid that from my parents so I could attend the sunrise service. I felt excitement in my fevered mind as I watched the sunrise and joined the people in singing Christ is Risen from the Dead. What foremost captivates me about this holiday is the celebration of Christ's victory over death. I love to remember the triumph of Sunday following the darkness of Friday. However, as I have matured in Christ, I have become increasingly captivated with how the wondrous resurrection of yesterday affects my life today.

Unlike human victories, which are short lived, Christ's victory is not momentary but momentous. Christ's triumphant defeat over death will continue to echo throughout all eternity. The resurrection of Jesus transferred me from the kingdom of darkness into the kingdom of light, for I have not only witnessed the power of the death and resurrection of Jesus

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Christ, I have participated in it. Romans 6:4 explains that we are buried with Christ and "raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too may walk in newness of life."

As a result, sin is "rendered powerless," and I am "no longer enslaved to sin" (Rom. 6:6). This is made possible through the glorious mystery of the believer's union with Christ. We are "alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11), which means His death is my death and His victory is my victory. His yesterday changed my today. I love the way this glorious news is captured in Rend Collective's song "Resurrection Day," located on the right.

Every believer becomes a new creation at the moment of salvation. Every believer dies that day and is raised up to new life. And still, all believers struggle to understand how to walk this new life in the Spirit. Paul gives the instructions: "So, you too, consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11). The word for "consider" here is $\lambda o \gamma i \zeta o \mu \alpha i$ (logizomai); it means to take account. This is what an accountant does when he balances the books. Paul literally challenges us to do the math of salvation. He wants us to recognize the truth of our death to sin just like an accountant recognizes the truth of a sum he just tallied. For Paul this is simple logic. We died with Christ. We are dead to sin. We rose with Christ. We are alive to God. Yet, the question remains: "How does this reality change me today?"

Throughout my life, at times I have struggled to consider myself dead to sin, when sin seems so attractive. I have learned, in those moments, to stop and remind myself that truth is not determined by my feelings (*I feel like I want to sin*) but by God's word (*I am dead to sin*).

Nevertheless, knowledge does not win the victory. I must use the Sword of Truth to slay any desire that would tempt me to sin. I will often meditate on the reality that desire to sin is a lie in my mind. I remind myself that I am dead to those desires. I spend time in prayer until I begin to experience victory over my thoughts. This is what is meant to take our thoughts captive (2 Cor.10:5). This is possible because I have been raised to new life in Christ Jesus. I am a new creation and old things have passed away, and all things have become new (2 Cor. 5:17). I love the way the reality is captured in the Puritan prayer titled "Regeneration," located on the right.

Christ's glorious resurrection is a victory that changes my present reality. I was lost and unable to see my way, when His life broke through and set me free. I am now alive in Christ and aware of the eternal spiritual implications of my life. The life I now live in the Spirit is only possible because of His resurrection from the dead.

So, this Resurrection Sunday, let us be challenged to celebrate what Christ accomplished yesterday so we might live changed lives today!

SING HIS PRAISES

When we consider the worship of a Holy God, we are confronted with a massive topic and limited understanding. We bow our knee, raise our voices, serve a child, minister to someone who is hurting, which are all examples of worship. Worship involves the totality of who we are before our Creator and Redeemer—Jesus! It is clear; God alone is worthy of our worship.

Created to worship, there are many facets to our worship. God invites us to "approach the throne of grace with boldness . . ." (Heb. 4:16), and Psalm 150 tells us to "Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!" We see the Lord inviting us to worship Him. And, all are welcome; there are no qualifiers.

Other passages speak to the details of music ministry. Every type of

instrument is suitable when glorifying God and we "sing a new song . . . play skillfully . . . with a joyful shout" (Psalm 33:3).

God cares about details, creativity, skill and discipline. He created us to be productive, proficient, and to serve others with our gifts.

THRONE OF GRACE

We bring our gifts, and we praise the Lord. He delights in our worship, and He even sings over us! (Zeph.3:17). He is worthy of our best efforts, and we do this with grateful hearts.

Romans 12:1 guides us in our worship: "Present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God; this is your true worship."

DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE



The night before the crucifixion, Jesus and the disciples ate their last Passover meal together. Jesus took the bread and cup and told His disciples to eat and drink in remembrance of Him. This was a new covenant—a covenant

solely dependent on His death and resurrection.

Throughout the ages, that Passover Seder has been celebrated on the Thursday before resurrection Sunday; it is often called Maundy Thursday. Maundy is Latin for command, for it was at this meal—after washing the disciples' feet, after announcing His betrayal, and after Judas left to collect his 30 pieces of silver—that Jesus gave a new commandment. "Love one another. Just as I have loved you, so love one another" (John 13:34).

Jesus taught that forgiveness and a relationship with God are available to anyone who accepts His invitation. And, he still invites us to sup at His table. We have that opportunity on Thursday, April 1. The Faith family will celebrate the new covenant by taking communion together as His disciples. Christ's invitation is always available, and all who accept it, can call Him Lord. If you haven't already, today is the day to respond to His invitation.

"Hallelujah!

Praise God in his sanctuary.
Praise him in his mighty expanse.

Praise him for his powerful acts; praise him for his abundant greatness.

Praise him with the trumpet blast; praise him with the harp and lyre.

Make disciples...


...as you are *going* about your daily life at home, at work, at the grocery store, or while on the phone, make disciples—lifelong followers of Jesus.

...as you are *baptizing* believers, make disciples—steadfast followers of Jesus every moment, every day.


...as you are *teaching* your children, your classes, even when you don't feel confident, make disciples—ones who grow in the knowledge of Christ and are obedient to the word.

LESSONS FROM THE TOMB*

They were grieving. Afraid. They had just witnessed the crucifixion of their Lord. I imagine they felt disappointment and shock as they looked around and saw no other disciples. Yet, these women showed great faith and courage. Their authentic relationships and their quick obedience teach us wonderful lessons from the tomb.

Seek (Matt. 28:1; Mark 16:1-6; Matt. 28:5)

In the midst of grieving, they rose at dawn on the first day of the week, prepared themselves, and went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away but did not find Jesus' body. An angel appeared and told them to not be afraid. The Scriptures remember these faithful women. What a powerful testimony to have this declared about us—sisters in Christ known to seek Jesus.

Strengthen (Mark 16:2–3)

On their way to the tomb, they asked each other who would roll away the stone. I admire that not knowing the answer still did not deter them. Think about it. They continued on with their hands ready to serve, their hearts prepared to honor, and their eyes expecting to see their Savior. Their question screams impossibility, but they trusted the faithfulness of the God of the impossible. What a wonderful example for us! We strengthen one another's walk even without all the answers.


Serve (Luke 24:1)

Their purpose was to anoint Jesus' body with spices to bless Him. They were intentional women on a mission. This act of humble service was done privately, behind the scenes, with no spotlight. Yet, the Lord honors these acts of service in the Gospels. What an example to us today! We can always find ways to serve one another.

Share (Matt. 28:6–8; Luke 24:12; John 20:3–9)

The angel said to go and tell the disciples that Jesus had risen. They hurried away in fear and joy to tell the others. I'm guessing they hoped their feet could run as fast as their hearts were beating with the exciting news. Most of the others were skeptical because the women's words seemed nonsensical. A few ran to see for themselves. Our testimony is a powerful tool. When we share it, the Holy Spirit uses it to move someone's heart closer to Jesus.

These vulnerable women were authentic. They did life and ministry together. I picture them as they cried with one another, comforted each other, expressed their fears and joy, and spoke of Jesus' words and how He met their needs. We, too, can strengthen one another's faith and in that, bless our Lord.
