



Remembering Renewal

There is something about the ever-circling years that brings renewal. As a New Year begins, we are prone to think about our lives and purpose. We renew goals and aspirations, desiring to change our former unsuccessful strivings.

However, renewal in the Christian life is markedly different from the world. For the world, any renewal inevitably slides back into disorder. It is simply a way of lying about the certainty of decay, as all things are making their way toward destruction. However, a believer's renewal comes with new birth and reminds us that we are remade as a New Creation. We understand that this world is not our home. Our greatest longing will one day be realized when God makes His home upon the New Earth in our midst (Revelation 21:3).

Today is a day to renew our minds and to remember that when we were without hope, Christ appeared (Ephesians 2:12). In His appearing, He saved us through the washing of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit (Titus 3:5).

Renewal is not a work we can do for ourselves; there is no scriptural regeneration manual. Instead, it is a work of God by the Holy Spirit through Jesus Christ, our Savior (Titus 3:5-6). Renewal is an act of the Trinity in the believer's life, and it begins with what Titus calls the "washing of regeneration." It is a spiritual rebirth where man is radically transformed. Without this, life cannot change.

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The word washing presents an interesting dichotomy. It means making something clean, while regeneration means creating anew—taking what once was and making something completely different.

My favorite way of picturing God's washing that Titus refers to is to see myself as a dirty pig in the throne room of God. I am out of place, filthy, and unfit for my regal surroundings. But God, who is rich in mercy, kneels and begins to wash me in the blood of Jesus Christ. As He washes me, He not only cleanses but redesigns. When He finishes, I am not a pretty pig but rather re-created royalty.

His blood washes me from the inside out, from all unrighteousness, taking away my heart of stone and giving me a heart of flesh (Ezekiel 36:26)—a new heart that wants to please instead of rejecting Him. He now works within me both to will and to do His good pleasure (Philippians 2:13). The anointing I receive imparts to me all things (I John 2:27). It teaches me to know the Lord (Hebrews 8:11). Behold, I am a New Creation; all things have become new. He made me alive while I was dead in trespasses and sins (Ephesians 2:1). Now, I know from where I come, so when I stand before the Lord, I tremble at my Master's call, "Whom shall I send and who will go for us?" (Isaiah 6:8). Because it is only the one who has been reformed by the consuming fire who can present himself as a living sacrifice, I humbly say, "Here am I...send me" (Isaiah 6:8).

So, how do we as New Creations live out our renewal? What is our part in this supernatural work? We commit to consistently renewing our minds to discern the good, pleasing, and perfect will of God (Romans 12:2). Renewal for the New Creation requires that he unswervingly resists conforming to the thought patterns of this age (Romans 12:2), continually exercising his senses to discern good from evil (Hebrews 5:14). It means that the mind of Christ within the New Creation constantly teaches him and motivates him to abide in love (1 John). Hymn writer Kate Wilkinson puts it like this:

May the mind of Christ, my Saviour, Live in me from day to day, By His love and power controlling All I do and say.

As His mind controls all I do and say, it reminds me to cast down every argument that exalts itself against the knowledge of God as I bring every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ (2 Corinthians 10:5). It means that I discipline myself to think on anything true, noble, just, pure, lovely, of good report, virtuous, and praiseworthy (Philippians 4:8). It means that I constantly redeem the time, lest I slip into the monotony of a wasted moment (Ephesians 5:16, Colossians 4:5).

In closing, the New Covenant believer does not need to fear that God's regenerating work will ever need to be repeated because he is secure in Christ. What is bestowed on us by His great mercy will not be revoked. Instead, we regularly come to comprehend who we are in Christ more fully. The Psalmist wrote: "Create in me a clean heart, O God; and renew a right spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10 KJV). For now, we see in a mirror dimly, but one day face to face, and when we finally see Him, we will be like Him for we will see Him as He is (1 Corinthians 13:12, 1 John 3:2).

Lancaster facility working in a variety of capacities.

Care Net Women's Resource Center is part of a national organization founded in 1975. According to the national website, its mission is to "empower women and men considering abortion to choose life for their unborn children and find abundant life in Christ." During Covid lockdowns, because of the type of services Care Net provides, it remained open.

"In 2021, the workers at the Lancaster venue shared the gospel with 464 clients," Diane said. "That's

exciting. And 42 of those clients prayed to accept Christ as their savior. Another 42 rededicated their lives. In addition, sixty-one family members heard the message."

Care Net provides many resources to women and men who come through the doors. One of the biggest is the educational component, where clients receive parental training for two years.

"Our mentoring program for fathers is also expanding and meeting in the evenings," Diane said. "I am excited to have the opportunity to present the gospel to each client who comes through our door. Last week, I shared the message with a Buddhist woman and her husband. God is good!" Care Net is regularly looking for men and women volunteers in many areas, including facilitating classes, helping with the baby boutique, serving as a mentor, and more. Like a garden and a baby, marriage takes time to grow and develop. In the beginning, it is blissful. But life gets messy, dirty, and complicated. Somewhere along the way, we wonder if it will survive the seasons of difficulty, unresolved conflicts, and hardships. Still, applying biblical truths, we can renew and restore this God-designed sacrament.

REDEEM — David, in Psalm 90:12, asks God to "teach us to number our days carefully so that we may develop wisdom in our hearts." In our media-saturated society, where we often feel alone even when we're with others, couples need God's wisdom to make quality time instead of squandering it. We need to REDEEM our time. When we focus our time on spiritual growth, we can build a vibrant life together, meeting each other's emotional, physical, and spiritual needs. Then we will experience rest and renewal.

RECONCILE — A quality marriage rests on the ability to RECONCILE. Unresolved conflict is detrimental. We need to admit our mistakes, ask forgiveness, and learn to restore the relationship. We do this by seeking biblical counseling, finding support from others, and attending marriage classes. When we follow Jesus's model of forgiveness and reconciliation (Eph. 4:31-32), our marriage is renewed and grows stronger.

REINFORCE — It's essential to practice what we learn from scripture. For marriage, as in life, daily we need to REINFORCE communication through love, kindness, care, humility, and patience (1 Corinthians 13:4-6). When we dated, we spent hours building intimacy with one another. It takes work by both partners. Renewal doesn't happen. It is hard work.

RESIST — Too many activities take our focus off God and our spouse. Sexual temptation for men and women is prevalent today. We must resist believing lies and thinking badly about our spouse, especially when we're hurt or angry. We must RESIST. The best way to fight temptation is for couples to pray together. It is the most potent weapon we have against the enemy in the struggle to preserve our marriages. It is God's tool to help us restore and renew our commitment. (James 5:16).

REAFFIRM —Finally, because of the love and affection for Christ and His truths which we have stored in our hearts, we can offer encouragement and show affection to one another. This helps REAFFIRM our love and commitment. The fourth-century theologian Richard Sibbes states, "knowledge and affection mutually help one another. It is good to keep up our affections of love and delight by all sweet inducements and divine encouragements; for what the heart likes best, the mind studies most."

Tiny seeds grow and bear abundant fruit with time and care. The unborn child miraculously develops in its mother's womb until it's time for birth. And the marriage that applies God's truths learns not just to survive but to thrive!

DONKEYS FOR JESUS

While still in the Philippines, my wife Lily and I read "Is Life so Dear?" by Brother Andrew (Andrew van der Bijl). It challenged us to take Bibles to the underground church in China. Asian Harvest, Inc., a local mission group in Manila, helped facilitate our trip to Hong Kong, our base.

The Revival Church of China provided Bibles, processed our tourist visas, and showed us how to pack 40-60 Bibles and other Christian literature in our suitcases and around our stomachs. (These would go undetected because of Chinese law forbidding pat-downs of tourists.)
Revival also instructed us on how to cross borders unnoticed.

In May 1996, our pastor prayed and asked our Lord to close the eyes of the Red Guards and Customs Police so the Bibles would get through to the Chinese believers. As God says: "I tell you, in the same way, there is joy in the presence of God's angels over one sinner who repents" (Luke 15:10).

After landing in Hong Kong, we rode the bus and train to the border and then walked into Shenzhen, China.

My wife and I separated to go through Customs. Without a hitch, she walked straight through the checkpoint, her bag full of Bibles. She meditated on Psalm 20:7, "Some trust in chariots and horses: but we will remember the name of the Lord our God." She watched the woman behind her, not with our group, to see if it was that easy. As the woman attempted to walk through, the inspector called her back to scan her luggage. Truly God had protected Lily.

There were no problems when my luggage was scanned. However, one of our pastors was detected, which led to interrogation and a \$500 fine. I was riddled with goosebumps, knowing I was in communist China—a godless nation.

Fortunately, I was able to bring two Mandarin Bibles home. Later, Pastor Roa from New Tribes Mission visited us. We gave him one of the Bibles to use when the occasion arose. While visiting some local Filipinos, he met a Chinese businessman. After the man agreed to read the Bible, Pastor Roa gave it to him. Later Pastor discovered that the man had accepted Christ and attended church. God is good!

Despite some Bibles being confiscated, this short-term mission trip was successful because of answered prayers. We were donkeys for Jesus, carrying His good news to a lost people in need of eternal salvation and soul renewal.



When asked: "Is smuggling Bibles unethical?" Rey answered: "I would rather obey God than the law of men. Our motive for this trip was obedience to the great commission: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20).

Rey and Seventhly continue to serve the Lord by sharing the Gospel in many settings.


Statistics show that a

Chinese house church is about 60 people who memorize scripture because they only have one Bible to share. Bibles are now printed in China and exported. The Chinese can buy them, but owners are registered and tracked, putting their lives at risk

for surveillance, arrest, and imprisonment.









On January 13, 1984, President Ronald Reagan issued a proclamation designating January 22 as the first National Sanctity of Human Life Day. (In 1973, January 22 was when the U.S. Supreme Court legalized abortion on-demand in all 50 states.)

Churches continue to recognize the third Sunday in January as Sanctity of Human Life Sunday. In 2022, that date falls on January 16, although some churches will mark it on the 23rd because it's closer to the anniversary. Either day is fine.

On Sanctity of Human Life Sunday, churches throughout the United States celebrate God's gift of life, commemorate the lives lost to abortion, and commit to protecting human life at every stage of development.

Please join us...



One of the darkest stains on the morality of our nation is the unfettered killing of the most vulnerable among us. Since the 1973 Roe vs.


