



Make Disciples

On December 8, 2008, comedian Penn Gillette, an avowed atheist, posted a YouTube video about a man who had given him a Gideons New Testament. Surprisingly, Penn shared his appreciation for the man who had shared the gospel with him. Penn stated that, in his opinion, if a Christian sincerely believed in hell, it would be imperative for him to evangelize others and warn them of the consequences of unbelief. Penn posed this question: "How much do you have to hate somebody not to proselytize?" Many Christians were amazed at Penn's insight, but what is especially surprising is that most professing believers rarely share the gospel with others.

In today's article, I will attempt to light a fire under believers who are reticent to share their faith. I will provide four biblical responses to four pertinent questions: Why should we make disciples? Of whom do we make disciples? What does it mean to make disciples? And how do we accomplish this?

The answer to these questions is found in Matthew 28:18–20. In verses 18 and 19, Jesus explains why we are to make disciples. He states, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and earth. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations...." First, why should we make disciples? Because all authority belongs to Jesus Christ. Every authentic believer confesses the Lordship of Christ and recognizes His sovereignty over every facet of their lives; believers demonstrate faith by verbally proclaiming the gospel to unbelievers. Since

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Jesus is in control; we should not fear how people respond to the gospel message, as we are empowered with the appropriate words at opportune times.

The results of a 2017 Barna survey claimed that only 2 out of every 10, or only 20%, believers think that making disciples is a command or that Christ has complete authority over their lives. A knee-jerk reaction to this statistic would have us quickly go out and find one person to share the gospel with so that we can say that Jesus is Lord. That is not the point; instead, we need a new mindset—an entire lifestyle overhaul. Those who follow Jesus are like Jesus and seek to make disciples wherever they go. To those who tremble at Jesus' command to make disciples, remember that as you work out your salvation, He works in you to do His good purpose (Philippians 2:13).

Secondly, whom do we disciple? In verse 19, Jesus answers this question in two ways, with the word "go" and the words "all nations." The word go is more appropriately translated as "as you are going." It is not an explicit command to leave one's current setting. Instead, going sometimes involves going home (Mark 5:19–20). The essence of going is to diffuse the aroma of the knowledge of Christ as He leads us in every direction (2 Corinthians 2:14). As we disperse the fragrance of Christ, we will receive different responses. To some, we bring the stench of death; to others, the aroma of life (2 Corinthians 2:15–16).

What is essential is that we speak the Word of God sincerely (2 Corinthians 5:17). We are commanded to make disciples "as we are going" and take the good news to all nations. This means that we must intentionally pursue relationships in the contexts God places us in with people who do not resemble us. I am convinced that the most effective form of evangelism in 21st-century America is hospitality. Hospitality in Greek means loving strangers. Suppose Christians are going to evangelize cross-culturally effectively. In that case, they must faithfully invite unchurched people into their lives, put the gospel on display, and demonstrate God's transforming power.

The third question that requires an answer is what it means to make disciples? Jesus provides two objectives: 1. baptizing and 2. teaching. This means that discipleship is initially evangelistic. We should all be unrelentingly seeking to lead others to Christ. In a familial context, this begins at home. Parents are primarily responsible for evangelizing and discipling their children. Just as parents preside over their children's physical births, they should actively facilitate their children's spiritual advent. Secondly, discipleship teaches people to observe what Christ has commanded (Matthew 28:20). Many might balk at this idea because of James' warning regarding the responsibilities inherent in being teachers (James 3:1). However, James' words specifically target formal offices within the church, not informal individual discipleship. Teaching people to observe Christ's commands occurs in context as believers live transparently alongside one another in the assembly of saints. We all have a responsibility to speak the truth to one another in love (Ephesians 4:15), to provoke one another to love and good works (Hebrews 10:24), and to teach and admonish one another through singing (Colossians 3:16). Likewise, fathers bear the unique responsibility of training and instructing their children in the Lord (Ephesians 6:4). Additionally, parents and grandparents are held responsible for teaching obedience to their children and grandchildren (Deuteronomy 4:9; 6:7). So, while not everyone is called to be a teacher to formal groups, we are all held accountable to teach those we are discipling.

Lastly, to answer how we make disciples, Jesus states in Matthew 28:20, "And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." In our discipleships, we train disciples to be in abject dependence on Christ. Jesus does not send us out into the world on our own; instead, He accompanies us wherever we go. The entire fullness of God's nature dwells bodily in Jesus, and we have been filled with Him, who is the head over every ruler and authority (Colossians 2:9-10). He not only goes with us as we make disciples, but He also thoroughly equips us through His Word for every good work (2 Timothy 3:17). As you faithfully nourish your hungry soul with the Word of God, He will equip you with the necessary skills to evangelize unbelievers. As Jesus commands us to spread the gospel, He walks beside us, strengthening us while utilizing our talents to build His church. Go! Obey our Lord and make disciples!

An Appetite for Evangelism by Pastor Josh Kornoff



Does Jesus's command in Matthew 28:19–20 bring encouragement or anxiety to your heart? It reads, "Go, therefore, and

make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." This call to evangelize is a tall order directed to every believer in Jesus Christ.

What comes to your mind when you think of the Great Commission? Many Christians feel dread and anxiety. They reluctantly yield to Christ's command to share the good news out of a sense of duty. But what if you could have a sincere appetite and joy when hearing this command? What if you could enjoy that universal call for believers to share their faith? Well, you can.

It begins with prayer and action. As you pray, ask God to help you be faithful to serve Him through evangelism. You'll find that your heart will align with God's will, and you'll desire to share more. His desires become our desires. Pray for help, desire, and opportunities, and then pray for specific people who need Jesus. Your intentional prayers will ignite an appetite in

you to share.

Along with prayer, action is needed. The more you share the gospel, the more you will delight in sharing. Evangelism is like other skills; the more you do it, the more proficient you become.

Are good evangelists gifted, or are they practiced? It is probably a little of both. They continue to learn how to share, ask questions, respond to objections, and offer hope to people. They know key Bible verses and have them ready to go. You can do the same; the more you prepare for and do evangelism, the more your eagerness will grow.

I went on a Mexico mission trip as a college student. Our team met weekly to pray and train. I was eager to share the gospel in Mexico. But once there, I was quickly frustrated because I was limited. We only had two interpreters, and many of us wanted to share. This disappointment challenged me to be more diligent at home. I asked myself, "Why am I so eager to share in a foreign country but not in my country where I speak the language?" My prayer and training had created a hunger for evangelism that could not be satisfied in a foreign context but only be fed here at home.

I encourage you to pray, prepare, and practice. You will find a hunger you didn't know you had, and the Lord will show you daily opportunities to share Him with a lost and dying world.

Pizza & Soft Drinks Saved My Day

In 1993, at a Rick and Mick pizza party for the AV high schools, I finally understood there was no way I could earn salvation. This was an evangelistic outreach for teens, and I was one of the volunteers who served pizza and soft drinks.

At the time, I was 41, attended church, and had my hair was past my shoulders. I was glad to see that one of the guest speakers also had long hair. He told his story of how Jesus helped him kick drugs, alcohol, and crime and turn his life around.

At the end of the evening, I thanked him for his moving testimony. I said I hoped it had hit home with his target audience. He commented he was happy to see another older, longhaired hippy professing Jesus, and it reminded him that God didn't provide salvation for just the clean-cut, neatly trimmed people. "Are you saved," he asked?

"I think I am. I'm a good husband, Dad, and person."

"Oh man, you're too busy trying to save yourself," he laughed. He opened his Bible and showed me Ephesians 2:8–9.

That night God opened my ears and my heart to His truth. There was no way I could earn my salvation because it is a gift from Him through the sacrifice of his Son. The gospel became clear and real.

I realized that God does not want us to be perfect. He accepts us as we are. Our only requirement is to believe the truth—that His Son Jesus became fully man, lived a sinless life, was tortured, bled, died, rose from the grave, and defeated death and sin for each of us.


