THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR

The kingdom of heaven can get confusing. What is it, and how should Christians view it today? To understand, we can look at the content of Jesus' teaching on the kingdom. Throughout His public ministry He preached the gospel, focusing on His theme of "repent because the kingdom of heaven has come near" (Matt. 4:17). His parables illustrated the content of the kingdom; His miracles demonstrated the power of the kingdom; His teaching established the morals of the kingdom; His actions demonstrated His reign over the kingdom; and His death, burial, and resurrection inaugurated His kingdom. After He was glorified, the Spirit came and expanded His kingdom, and one day Jesus will return and consummate His kingdom.

We see from the Old Testament that Israel consistently rejected the Lord as their ruler. In 1 Samuel, God clearly tells Samuel that the people were not rejecting him as their judge, but the Lord as their king (1 Sam. 8:7). Despite their rejection, the Lord remained faithful and promised to one day send His Son—a direct descendant of King David—to rule over His people (Ps.110:1). When Jesus announced that the kingdom of heaven had come near, He was letting people know that their King had come. However, they wanted to force Him to be their political ruler (John 6:15), which He would not allow. Rather,

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Jesus came to deliver His people from their slavery to sin and to establish Himself as ruler of their hearts (John 8:36).

This rule from the "inside-out" is seen in the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus establishes the morals of His kingdom. His subjects will not simply comply with outward actions, but will resist sin's temptation and rule because they will be governed by the inward man. The sin that Jesus seeks to overthrow is that which tempts man to call his brother a fool (Matt. 5:22), to worship God while having interpersonal conflict (Matt. 5:24), or to look with lust (Matt. 5:28).

The morality of the Kingdom is so intrinsic that it is only realized by an inward regeneration and indwelling of the Holy Spirit (Titus 3:5)—the Spirit poured out upon the believer through the finished work of Christ (Titus 3:6; John 7:38-39). Paul later explains to the Ephesians that the Spirit strengthens the inner man with power and equates the Spirit's work to Christ dwelling in the heart of the believer. The morality of the kingdom is established through obedience to Christ's new command to "love as He has loved" through the indwelling Holy Spirit (John 13:34; Rom. 5:5).

Scripture makes it clear that entrance into the kingdom of heaven is only supplied through the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ (John 14:6; Acts 4:12). Those who confess Jesus as Lord and believe in their heart that God raised Him from the dead will be saved (Rom. 10:9). This confession is an outward proclamation of an inward rule. The heart of man can only submit to the rule of Jesus through the promises of the new covenant that were ratified at Calvary (Ezek. 36:25-27; Luke 22:20). This new covenant is not of the letter but of the Spirit (2 Cor. 3:6). It is realized already in the spiritual realm, but not fully experienced in the physical world.

The "already" of the kingdom means that believers "are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His possession" (1 Pet. 2:9). We are transferred from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of light (Col.1:13), "re-created royalty" now charged with waging war against sinful desires (1 Pet. 2:11). We are citizens of heaven, which is not occupied with things of earth but with "righteousness, peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit" (Rom.14:17). As citizens, we must remind one another of who we are in Christ and that we have a new heart and new desires. As we remind one another of who now rules our hearts, we help each other see the foreign power of sin that seeks to establish a stronghold in our lives.

There is also a "not yet" of this kingdom. While we "re-created royalty" partake of the divine nature and live out our identity in Christ through growth in sanctification, entrance into the "eternal kingdom" will be "richly provided" (2 Pet.1:11). Though our citizenship is currently in heaven, we eagerly await the return of our Savior who will transform our lowly body into the likeness of His glorious body (Phil. 3:20-21), and we love His appearing when He will abolish every rule, authority, and power that opposes Him (Cor. 15:24).

His kingdom has come near, but it has not yet been fully realized upon the earth. There are still many rebel hearts and rebel powers left to conquer. But one day every knee will bow before Him. All who resist His kingdom during their lifetimes will be delivered up to destruction (2 Pet. 3:7). But for those who loved His appearing, there is a promised crown of righteousness (2 Tim. 4:8). And so every citizen cries out "Maranatha!"— Come Lord Jesus! (1 Cor.16:22).








SUMMER READS

STANDING ON HIS WORD

Four years ago, I began my crochet blog. Weekly I share new patterns and tutorials with my followers on various social media. And, I share about myself along with Bible verses here and there. The blog has grown beyond my wildest imagination, and I had no idea that God would use this platform to share my faith.

Most of the crochet community hangout on Instagram. I chat with, and get to know the crocheters, considering them friends.

Throughout 2020, I stayed silent on political topics while many radical, feminist viewpoints were shared and people who disagreed were verbally attacked.

A few months ago, I realized that staying silent was simply not acceptable. How could I claim to know Christ yet not stand up for the unborn or for marriage as He designed it? In March, I told my followers I am a conservative, pro-life Christian who believes marriage is between a man and a woman. I got incredible backlash in the comments—people I considered friends were calling me "trash" and bigoted." Many said, "Christ wouldn't say that."

What saddened me most was the fact that many of the commenters claimed to be Christians. The truth is, their Jesus was different altogether—one created through a non-literal interpretation of the Bible. After I posted, a crochet magazine even cancelled my contract.

Before this experience, I confined persecution to situations seen in the Bible. This has been difficult, but I am thankful. I now have a better understanding of what it means to be persecuted for Christ. Trials and persecutions are coming and may be different than we expect, but I encourage you to be prepared and alert.

A deep peace came over me. I knew the Lord was working in me, and I can look back over my life and see Him working all along. "Jesus told them, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6).
