



# The Advent of His Return

The Advent season is an excellent time to look back and prepare for what lies ahead. Advent originates from the Latin word adventus, meaning coming. It is a season of reminiscing and anticipation, where we gaze at the past and turn to the future. While meditating on God's Word, I often wonder why many people were unprepared for Christ's first appearance. And I am reminded of the lyrics from Chris Rice's song, Welcome to Our World. They state, "Hope that You don't mind our manger, How I wish we could have known, But long-awaited Holy Stranger, Make Yourself at home, Please make Yourself at home."

I do not simply want to "wish we could have known"; I want to be prepared for His return. Jesus reprimanded religious leaders of His day for the air of superiority they displayed by claiming that "If we had lived in the days of our ancestors, we wouldn't have taken part with them in shedding the prophets' blood" (Matthew 23:30). Though they continued to participate in the sins of their forefathers, in pretense, they asserted to be blameless, claiming these deeds were beneath them.

To avoid their erroneous perspective, I want to offer three exhortations for preparing for Christ's return.

First, we should not arrogantly judge those who existed before us. The Pharisees' imperfections included their inability to perceive themselves as capable of committing

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the same sins, yet they did much worse. Their self-righteous confidence resulted in catastrophic failure. They had not only participated in killing the prophets but also wholeheartedly engaged in the persecution of the Son of God, as we would have if it were not for the grace of God. We would be murderous and callous toward Christ if God had not redeemed us. The prayer that God desires to hear from us is "Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (Luke 18:13). God promises to utterly purify those who have confessed their sins (1 John 1:9). Confessors leave behind the past and seize the future (Philippians 3:13); as they purge themselves of their formerly defiled flesh and soiled soul, they turn to holiness under the submission and fear of God (2 Corinthians 7:1).

The inner change in 2 Corinthians is driven by God's promises, the second objective of those who want to prepare for Christ's return. Because the Pharisees lacked perception of God's Word, they did not recognize Jesus, the Messiah, when He arrived. As spiritually blinded leaders, though they read Scripture, they did not have God's Spirit indwelling them. There is a difference between merely being cognizant of God's promises versus claiming them as our own. To be ready for Christ's return, we must interpret Scripture rightly.

Jesus castigated the Pharisees for their shallow understanding of Scripture; with their skewed perspective, they hoped to merit eternal life without the benefit of knowing Him. (John 5:39). If our motive for studying the Bible does not involve intimately communing with Jesus and making Him known to others, then our studies are in vain. We shall not recognize Him upon His return if we do not comprehend Him in Scripture. Paul explains in Ephesians that reading God's Word is the key to understanding the mystery of Christ: That He has united all peoples as one body in Christ through the church (Ephesians 3:4-6). To prepare for His return, we must be able to see Jesus in Scripture.

Third, we need to be purifying ourselves in anticipation of His return. Peter admonishes us to endeavor to lead unimpeachable, unsoiled lives while we wait for Christ's return (2 Peter 3:14). John explains that when we see Jesus at His second coming, we shall be like Him; therefore, all those who hope for His appearing must lead sanitized lives as He is holy (1 John 3:3). Paul explains that we were predetermined to be fashioned into the likeness of His Son (Romans 8:29). It is the upmost desire of believers to resemble Christ while they await His arrival. Irrefutably, His return is imminent as He stands at the portal! (James 5:9). Signs of His return are increasing, and He warns His bride to be prepared, for all needful things are occurring.

Christ is coming soon. To all those who are anticipating Christ's return, I encourage you to humble yourselves, receive grace to help study and meditate on Scripture to commune with Jesus, lead sanctified lives, and clothe yourself in His righteousness (Matthew 22:11, Revelations 19:8). Christ is not delaying His promise; instead, He is long-suffering. May your conduct glorify God as you anticipate His coming (2 Peter 3:9-11).

Let me close by reminding you of the words from Larry Norman in *I Wish We'd All Been Ready*: "There's no time to change your mind, How could you have been so blind, The father spoke the demons dined, The son has come and you've been left behind."

Don't be left behind. Be prepared for the advent of Christ.

Rest him, O loving Spirit! Let Thy calm Fall on his soul tonight. O holy Dove, Spread Thy bright wing above him, let him rest Beneath its shadow; let him know afresh the Infinite truth and might of Thy dear name— "Our Comforter!" # First Nativity Scene

St. Francis of Assisi is credited with staging the first nativity scene in 1223. The only historical account of Francis' nativity scene comes from The Life of St. Francis of Assisi by St. Bonaventure, a Franciscan monk born five years before Francis' death.

According to Bonaventure's biography, St. Francis received permission from Pope Honorius III to set up a manger with hay and two live animals—an ox and an ass—in a cave in the Italian village of Grecia. He then invited the villagers to come gaze upon the scene while he preached about "the babe of Bethlehem."

The 12 days of

Christmas is the period in the Christian tradition that marks the span between the birth of Christ and the coming of the Magi, the three wise men. It begins on December 25 and runs through January 6 (the Epiphany, sometimes called Three Kings' Day even the Bible doesn't say there were "three" kings). The four weeks preceding Christmas are known as Advent, which begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on December 24.

The history of the carol is somewhat murky. The earliest known version first appeared in a 1780 children's book, Mirth Without Mischief. Some historians think the song could be French in origin, but most agree it was designed as a "memory and forfeits" game—you miss a verse, you forfeit something.

The version we sing today comes from an English composer Frederic Austin; in 1909, he set the melody and lyrics, adding his drawnout version of "five goold rings."

# BILL AND TAMMY MCKEEVER



Bill McKeever grew up with Latter-day Saints while living in east San Diego county. "I have only good memories of those friendships," he said.

"But when I became a Christian, my friends began challenging what I believed. As I studied the LDS doctrine, it became apparent that my LDS acquaintances belonged to an organization that strongly emphasizes works as a means of justification." Bill said this prevents LDS members from knowing for sure if they are forgiven of their sins. "Sharing the good news with this people group I've come to love is the only remedy for their lack of assurance."

McKeever founded Mormonism Research Ministry, a missionary and apologetics organization that challenges the claims of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints with the hope of informing the Body of Christ about the differences between Mormonism and Christianity.

Bill has also tried to reach out to LDS church members with the truth of God's Word. He has written books about Mormonism.

He is the editor of MRM's bimonthly newsletter *Mormonism Researched*.

His wife Tammy is MRM's office manager and is directly responsible for the database and product orders. She also does much of the bookkeeping.

McKeever said that this quote says it best. "If everything that is called Christianity these days is Christianity, then there is no such thing as Christianity. A name applied indiscriminately to everything, designates nothing" (B.B. Warfield–1851-1921).

Bill and his wife, Tammy, live in the Salt Lake City area. They have three grown children: Kristen, Kendra, and Jamin.
